## Phonics/Penmanship:

Due to the short week, we will not be introducing new word wall words. Please continue to practice all introduced words at home. Students should be able to read and spell each word in a snap!

We have introduced contractions. A contraction is a shortened form of one or two words. In a contraction, an apostrophe takes the place of the missing letter or letters. Some contractions are: it's (it is), I'm (I am), can't (cannot), how's (how is).
