Native American Games and Sports

Renaud recently joined the school lacrosse team. Lacrosse is a fast-paced game in which two teams of players use long rackets with a net on the end to pass a ball while running up and down a field. Renaud's coach told him that the game was originally played by Native Americans and that some tribes, like the Iroquois, still compete in international lacrosse competitions. Renaud was intrigued by this and did more research on Native American games. He compiled a list of these games to share with his lacrosse teammates, along with the following message.

Greetings Lacrosse Players!

I thought everyone would enjoy learning about a few more games originally played by the tribes of North America. Some of these games will seem familiar to you because they are played much like games we already know. Gather a group of friends and play one of these games!

Renaud

Game	Description	Tribe
Double ball	A game similar to lacrosse, but only women were allowed to play.	Northeastern Tribes
Pahasaheman	A rough game with similarities to both soccer and football. Men played against women. Women were allowed to tackle men and to throw the ball. Men had to kick the ball and couldn't tackle women.	Delaware
Patol	Two or four players took turns throwing stone dice. Unlike most gambling games, this was a popular spectator sport played in front of large crowds.	Southwestern Tribes
High Kick	A game played indoors in the winter. Players tried to kick a sack that was suspended from the roof on a string. The sack was raised higher each round.	Inuit
Hoop and Pole	This was a game that used hunting and warrior skills. Players tried to throw a lance or spear through a rolling hoop.	Tribes universally played this game.
Blowgun	Contestants blew darts through a long tube. They competed for distance and accuracy.	Cherokee
