# A Balanced Liveracy Program

## Interactive Read Aloud

- > Improves listening skills, builds vocabulary, aids reading comprehension, and motivates children to read.
- > Is the single most influential factor in young children's success in learning to read.
- > Daily read alouds with time given for talk about significant events, use of language, or other important aspects of instruction.

### Shared Reading

- Gives students practice in learning how print works in relation so the words they hear.
- Is an opportunity for students to see the text, observe their teacher reading with fluency and expression, and provides an arena for students to read along with the teacher.

#### Guided Reading


- . > Small group instruction where students read text at their "instructional level" with explicit instruction and teacher support
  - Enables students to develop and use strategies that will promote the construction of meaning.

#### Book Clubs

- Increases students' enjoyment of reading
- > Makes students aware of the value of their personal responses to what they read.
- Engages students in meaningful literary discussion.
- Demonstrates new ways of interpreting and analyzing text.
- Fosters critical thinking.

Independent Writing

- > Teacher provides daily mini lessons based on the needs of the writers.
- > Students are engaged in the writing process.
- > Students use a writer's notebook and writing folders to draft, revise, edit, and then publish pieces of work.
- > Topics are self-selected, or at times assigned.
- > Teachers conference with students to support and address individual needs.
- > Students may have conferences with peers.
  - > There are often share sessions at the end of the writing workshop.



## Reading Strategies Developed Throughout the year

Forming an Initial Understanding- Evidence of a general understanding of the text.

- Is a basic understanding of the text as a whole demonstrated?
- Are the important elements of the text understood?
- Do the students notice if what they are reading doesn't make sense?

### Developing an Interpretation

- Are clues or evidence from the text used to make inferences, draw conclusions, predict events, and infer motivations of the characters?
- Are initial understandings revised, reshaped, or deepened?
- Do the students respond to the author's ideas?

Demonstrating a Critical Stance- Evidence of stepping outside of the text, challenging the text, and making judgments of quality about parts of the text as a whole.

- Does the student challenge the text by disagreeing or questioning the author?
- Does the student make connections between the text and their own knowledge and experience?
- Does the student go beyond the text to judge its literacy quality?

This is something that I will revisit frequently throughout the year. This is great to review this with your child.
