Holocost Survivor Visit

On Wednesday the 19th of April a special speaker was brought into RLMS to talk about a very traumatizing life experience of hers. Judith Altmann, currently 92, is a holocaust survivor who came to RLMS to talk about her

experiences. Ms. Altmann grew up in Czechoslovakia and at the age of 14 with her mother, father, and niece were sent to Auschwitz. Auschwitz is a Nazi concentration camp located in Poland and was widely known as being a concentration and death camp. Ms. Altmann recalls of the horrid train car ride to Auschwitz without food or water, and nearly 70 people thrown into tiny box cars. Then after nearly 5 days, they arrive at Auschwitz and are met by dozens of nazis. They are then shoved in lines, separated into sick, children, men, and women. The children are sent to work camps to do grueling labor in terrible living conditions with little food and water. But, the parents however do not meet the same fate. The parents are told they are going to showers, but instead of water, gas fills the room and all are dead within seconds. Then Ms. Altmann follows with the sight of the barracks with her niece. The gigantic barracks cloud the sky and inside are hundred of children only with a small row of space tightly packed. NO filtration of air and the putrid odor encase the barrack.

In the labor camp there are numerous jobs to be done. Shaving hair, piling the dozens of bodies, cleaning, working in factories, and other horrid work. In the camp, the children were each given a 4 inch square of bread for one week, a sip of soup every few days, and minimal amounts of water. After a while though, she and her niece were transported to another camp. In this camp the labor was more tiring and the food was less. It seemed like there was no end to this torture.

At one point Judith recalls of this woman who saved her life, yet was a nazi. Judith was sick and got a bad cut that could get infected easily. All that were sick were killed in the camps. Taken away by a nazi woman, instead of heading to the death camp, Judith was taken to an officer. The nazi woman told the officer of Judith being very important as Judith spoke multiple languages. This was true, and the fact that Ms. Altmann spoke so many languages saved her life.

At the age of 18, she was liberated with her niece. They were free to go and they had a few choices. Later she came to America and started to share her stories of the Holocaust. Clearly, these events aren't as plain as described in this short article. In order to publish this, I wanted to keep the ideas central and not put a lot of detailed imagery into a school article.
