


his favorite animals are tigers, his favorite color is red his favorite food is pizza.


In conclusion, we are very happy that Mr. Purzycki has joined the RLMS staff, and we can't wait for a fantastic year with him!

### **Chromebooks**

Recently, Chromebooks were introduced to the seventh grade of Roger Ludlowe Middle School. We interviewed a few teachers to learn how this is affecting the school.

First, we interviewed Ms. Brown-Wilusz, a seventh grade Science teacher. She had a very positive outlook on the Chromebooks. "I think it is a very useful tool, and students are very excited". Ms. Brown-Wilusz feels that some things are much easier to teach, because teachers used to need to get a laptop cart to teach things that required internet, but now they don't need to. And Ms. Brown-Wilusz would change the fact that the chromebooks aren't touchscreen.

Next we interviewed Mr. Haxhi, a seventh grade Social Studies teacher who had a neutral outlook on these devices. He feels that chromebooks are "providing students with an opportunity to access more of the internet", while he is concerned about less face-to-face communication, and interaction. Mr. Haxhi thinks it's easier to do somethings, and similar to Ms. Brown-Wilusz, he used to have to book a lab to have computers but now he's able to teach more material than before since students have their chromebooks all of the time. At this point Mr. Haxhi wouldn't change much about the chromebooks.

Finally, we interviewed Mrs. Dias-Kohler, who said she doesn't think the chromebooks affect the students at all, positively or negatively.

She thinks that students don't need more time on technology, but that when needed, chromebooks can make it easier to teach by providing more opportunities for research, etc. Mrs. Dias-Kohler also wouldn't change anything about them and she wrapped it up by saying as long as the rules are followed it is a useful tool. 
# **New Notes in the Music Department**
