#### **Music News**

As the month of December flew by, Kindergarten and Grade 1 students sang, danced and moved to holiday music. Grade 2 students studied the *Nutcracker*. Grade 3-experienced major and minor music and performed rhythmic patterns to Leroy Anderson's *Sleigh Ride*. Grade 4 was introduced to F# on the recorder and Grade 5 put the finishing touches on their winter concert. On January 9<sup>th</sup>, we welcomed Mr. Jacob Bartfield as a student vocal music teacher for seven weeks. In the future, we will focus on pitch, and Grade 3 will begin study of the soprano recorder. Have fun playing in the snow!

During the month of January, students at Stratfield Elementary are discovering interesting mathematical concepts through Number Corner:

- \* In kindergarten, three different workouts feature addition combinations to 10: Calendar Grid, Days in School, and Computational Fluency. During Calendar Collector, the class collects Unifix cubes in three different colors, places the cubes in the Calendar Collector pocket chart, and also displays the results on recording strips. The Number Line workout deals with interval counting and comparing numerals to 20.
- \* For first graders, the new year begins with familiar routines infused with fresh elements. Calendar Grid markers feature single equations and story problems with missing addends, minuends, or subtrahends, and students tell math stories to match the equations using various strategies. They return to collecting coins in Calendar Collector and record their collection on a graph. Students will also practice using known facts to solve related facts of 1 more or 1 less.
- \* This month in second grade the Calendar Markers pick up where the Calendar Collector left off last month, giving students continued opportunities to read and interpret picture and bar graphs based on data collected while surveying other second graders on a variety of topics. The Calendar Collector this month features data collection based on the results of a daily tile sampling experiment. Finally, the Computational Fluency workouts revolve around a powerful subtraction strategy that underscores the relationship between addition and subtraction.
- \* In third grade this month, workouts offer exposure to and experience with a variety of skills and concepts. Students continue to develop their understanding of fractions in Calendar Grid. They think about time as they collect minutes and hours in the Calendar Collector. The Computational Fluency workout is very similar to last month's, but this month students think about multiplying by 5 and 10.
- \* This month fourth graders use the Computational Fluency and Problem Solving workouts to focus on division in which students learn and practice division strategies and consider division situations in contexts. Meanwhile, the Calendar Grid focuses on geometric shapes and scaling.
- \* In fifth grade, students work on adding, subtracting, and multiplying fractions and decimals throughout the month. Additionally, they analyze and compare patterns, graph ordered pairs based on those patterns in the Calendar Grid workout and write expressions and equations to represent those patterns.

#### Art at Stratfield

This month has been filled with hard work for our Stratfield students. Kindergarten is reviewing cutting and gluing skills with some scaly fish drawings. 1st grade just finished some beautiful winter cardinals. 2nd Grade just finished their cars and trucks and we are about to try some traditional style Japanese fish printing. 3<sup>rd</sup> grade is completing amazing cov fish drawings in colored pencil. 4<sup>th</sup> grade is beginning a study on shadow and value in art as we draw detailed flowers. 5<sup>th</sup> grade is getting a taste of life in a design firm as we are studying packaging design and creating unique cereal boxes. - Bob Matarazzo, Art Teacher


